## Expanding Affordable and Supportive Housing

As Toronto continues to face an unprecedented housing crisis, WoodGreen has made housing growth and innovation a cornerstone of our strategic plan. This year, we made significant progress toward our ambitious goal of expanding our affordable housing portfolio, while also ensuring that our current communities remain vibrant, sustainable, and supportive.

### Innovating housing and care for seniors

In February, WoodGreen and Michael Garron Hospital officially opened our newest Cluster Care site at 1080 Queen Street East. This innovative housing model combines affordable housing with 24-hour personal support, allowing older adults to age in place with dignity and independence.

The nine new units, converted from former office space, expand our existing Cluster Care portfolio and provide a crucial pathway for seniors transitioning out of hospital care to maintain their independence in a supportive community setting.



Last October, we also celebrated the grand reopening of St. Hilda's Seniors Community after a major renovation that secured the long-term viability of more than 330 affordable homes for seniors. The project, supported by all levels of government, ensured the preservation of this vital community asset and brought new life to the buildings with modernized, safe, and affordable homes.



St. Hilda's now stands as a model of aging-in-place best practices, where seniors can access supportive care services and continue to thrive in community.

### Growing and greening our housing portfolio

We continued to expand our housing footprint with the addition of five new sites that added 85 new housing units to our portfolio, along with many more in development over the next year. At the same time, we advanced major initiatives to make our housing portfolio more sustainable. WoodGreen secured federal funding through CMHC's Canada Greener Affordable Housing program, allowing us to lay the groundwork for deep energy retrofits across multiple properties. This essential planning will ensure our buildings are greener, more energy-efficient, and healthier for the residents who call them home.



We also launched the 444 Logan Net Zero Retrofit Project, supported by \$27 million in CMHC funding. Once complete, this project will transform the site into one of the most energy-efficient affordable housing communities in the country.

To accelerate new housing growth, we are in the process of launching an Equity Fund, which will play a key role in new

capital for development. Meanwhile, our housing pipeline progressed with four key partnerships that together could deliver 500 new affordable units, now moving through due diligence and city applications.

As we celebrate these accomplishments, we are also building for the future. This past year, we broke ground on two new developments that will bring much-needed affordable and supportive housing for seniors.



At 185 Cummer Avenue, 59 new units will provide permanent housing for older adults and seniors who are at risk of housing insecurity, along with supports to help them age in place.

At 60 Bowden Street, a heritage-inspired redevelopment will add 50 units, including dedicated spaces with 24/7 supports for residents who need daily assistance.



Both projects mark exciting progress toward our housing goals and reflect our commitment to creating inclusive communities where seniors can thrive.



## Supporting Youth on Their Path to Success

This year marked a transformational moment for youth services at WoodGreen. With new partnerships, inspiring events, and bold plans for the future, we expanded our ability to ensure young people across Toronto have the support they need to thrive.

### A stronger future together

This past year, WoodGreen officially welcomed Turning Point Youth Services (TPYS) into our organization. By joining forces, we have created a stronger and more coordinated response to the complex needs facing youth in Toronto.

Together, we are able to offer a more complete continuum of care, including mental health, employment, housing, newcomer support, and youth justice services. This integration strengthens our shared commitment to empowering young people and their families and expands our impact across East Toronto.

## Inspiring pathways at the Youth Success Conference

Last October, we hosted the first-ever Youth Success Conference – Mino Bimaadziwin (“the good life”) in partnership with MLSE Launchpad and the Toronto Council Fire Native Cultural Centre. More than 150 students and young adults came together for a day of skill-building, wellness activities, and inspiration. Youth explored career options, connected with mentors, and learned strategies to navigate systemic barriers.

The event began with a traditional opening led by Council Fire, grounding the day in Indigenous teachings about balance of body, mind, emotion, and spirit. The conference left participants with new skills, renewed confidence, and stronger community connections.



## Connecting youth leaders internationally

WoodGreen's Ìdàgbà Rites of Passage team represented Toronto at the International Rites of Passage Conference in Washington, DC. Youth participants connected with other young leaders from across North America, sharing their experiences and building networks of support.

While in Washington, the group also toured Howard University and explored the National Museum of African American History and Culture, deepening their understanding of heritage and leadership.



## Expanding essential supports

This year, WoodGreen's Youth Housing Navigator program expanded its reach by embedding life skills supports directly in the community and forging new partnerships with Downtown Legal Services and Justice for Children and Youth. These collaborations ensure young people facing housing instability can also access crucial legal supports, helping them to secure stability and plan for their futures. Over the past year, the program supported 88 youth in finding stable housing, a 33% increase from the previous year. This growth reflects both the rising demand and the effectiveness of the program in helping young people build a foundation for long-term success.



## Looking Ahead: A New Youth Wellness Centre

Perhaps our most exciting milestone is the development of WoodGreen's new Youth Wellness Centre, a 20,000 square foot hub at Birchmount and Eglinton. Set to open in the next year, this dynamic space will bring together mental health, employment, housing, recreation, settlement, leadership, and justice supports under one roof. Designed through consultation with youth, the Centre will serve more than 3,000 young people annually, creating a vibrant community where every young person is seen as a whole person with unlimited potential. This new Centre represents a bold step forward in how Toronto supports its next generation.

## Homeward Bound: 20 Years of Transforming Futures

This year marked an extraordinary milestone for WoodGreen's Homeward Bound program, which celebrated 20 years of empowering single women-led families and their children to build lives of stability, independence, and hope. Since its launch in 2004, Homeward Bound has supported 320 women and 476 children to transition off social assistance and into meaningful employment, transforming not only individual lives but entire family trajectories. We are thrilled to see this number continue to grow, with a record 40 participants successfully completing the first phase of the program this year, with 90 per cent of them receiving college acceptances!

At the heart of Homeward Bound's success is the vision of creating a holistic, four-year pathway that combines housing, academic upgrading, fully funded college education, employment training, internships, and wraparound family supports such as child care, after-school programming, and trauma-informed counselling. This comprehensive approach breaks the cycle of poverty and creates lasting change that ripples across generations.



The program's inception and continued growth would not have been possible without the steadfast support of Ed Clark and the Clark Family Foundation, whose leadership and generosity have been instrumental in Homeward Bound's impact. For two decades, Ed Clark has stood beside WoodGreen and the women in the program,

championing a model that empowers women to lift their families out of poverty and into sustainable careers.

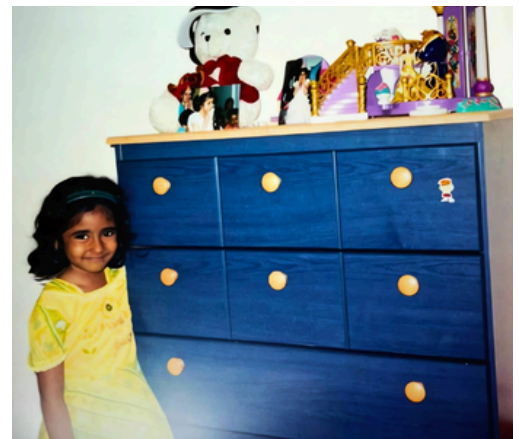

As part of the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations, WoodGreen highlighted the story of Nawal Arshi, who entered Homeward Bound with her mother in 2004 as a four-year-old. Today, she is a Master's student in Physician Assistant Studies, inspired by her mother's journey through the program and determined to serve marginalized communities. ### **A New Chapter with Toronto Community Housing**

Building on 20 years of proven success, Homeward Bound is beginning an exciting new chapter through a transformative partnership with Toronto Community Housing (TCHC). Launching in early 2025, this three-year pilot will bring the program directly to women-led families living in TCHC communities.



Up to 25 single mothers will participate in the pilot, gaining access to Homeward Bound's full suite of education, training, and supports while continuing to live in their TCHC homes. This innovative model eliminates the need to build new housing, allowing the program to scale more quickly and extend its reach to women who are eager for change. By moving through the program together as a cohort, participants will gain the

added benefit of peer support and community, which has been a key factor in Homeward Bound's long-standing success.

For TCHC, where 53% of households are women-led, this partnership represents a powerful opportunity to break the cycle of poverty and create lasting economic independence for families. Together, WoodGreen and TCHC are ensuring that more women and their children have the tools and opportunities to realize their potential.

### Looking Ahead

After 20 years, Homeward Bound has proven that when women are given the right supports, they succeed, and their children succeed with them. With the continued commitment of partners like the Clark Family Foundation and the expansion into TCHC communities, the program is poised to reach even more families in the years ahead. The legacy of Homeward Bound is clear: empowered mothers, thriving children, and a stronger, more resilient Toronto.

## Expanding Support for Vulnerable Populations

This year we were thrilled to see the Toronto Community Crisis Service (TCCS) expand city-wide, providing critical mental health support to residents in need.

WoodGreen has long partnered with TCCS, and with this expansion, we were able to formalize our role in the East Expansion alongside the Gerstein Crisis Centre. This work allows us to deliver timely access to

psychotherapy and strengthen connections between TCCS and COSS (Crisis Outreach Service for Seniors), ensuring that people in crisis can receive compassionate, client-centered support in the community without involving police.





This year, we formally joined up with East York Meals on Wheels (EYMOW), growing our collective impact with an 18 percent increase in meals served, from 54,607 last year to 64,422 this year. This coming together allows us to provide an even more comprehensive range of programs and services to seniors and residents across the GTA.



EYMOW's focus on nutritious meals and personalized support perfectly complements WoodGreen's broader community care work, helping seniors maintain independence, health, and connection within their communities.

## **Celebrating and Supporting Seniors**

This year, WoodGreen's seniors programs continued to grow in both innovation and impact, offering older adults more ways to connect, stay active, and share their voices with the wider community.

### **Building community through NORCs**

Our Seniors Active Living Centres have been at the forefront of developing Naturally Occurring Retirement Communities (NORCs) on Toronto's east side. In the Distillery and Canary District, our team partnered with the Living Long in the Distillery NORC to co-create new community-based programming that reflects the interests of local seniors.

Together, we secured funding to launch new falls-prevention classes, ensuring older adults can stay safe and independent while remaining engaged with their neighbours.



### Bringing technology to aging

This year we expanded the use of CaregiVR, a program that uses virtual reality to create immersive experiences for seniors. Now available across multiple cluster care and community sites, this program opens up new opportunities for seniors to explore the world, revisit meaningful places, or try something new, all from the comfort of their own community.



### Amplifying senior voices through media

WoodGreen's Seniors Advisory Council played a leading role in two creative projects that celebrated the stories, wisdom, and resilience of older adults.

The Council launched the Students of Aging podcast, a series researched and hosted by seniors themselves, offering thoughtful conversations on topics ranging from aging in place to poetry, travel, and friendship. Funded by the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Program, the podcast gives listeners a chance to hear directly from seniors about the challenges and joys of aging.

The Council also partnered with young filmmaker Stella Racca to create *When You Find the One*, a documentary commemorating the 20th anniversary of same-sex marriage in Ontario. Featuring 2SLGBTQIA+ seniors who were among the first in the province to marry, the film captures stories of courage, love, and equality. Seventeen seniors, many active members of WoodGreen's Rainbow Club, took part in this intergenerational project, leaving a lasting record for future generations.

Together, the podcast and documentary show the power of storytelling in celebrating aging, honouring history, and challenging stigma. Through these projects, WoodGreen seniors continue to shape the narrative of what it means to age with purpose, connection, and pride.

### **Food security for seniors**

Food security is an essential part of supporting seniors to live healthy, independent lives. This past year, WoodGreen expanded access to nutritious food across our seniors' housing communities, helping residents stretch their budgets and maintain their well-being. In some buildings, seniors can visit an on-site food bank designed to feel like a neighbourhood grocery store, where they choose the items that best suit their needs and preferences. Beyond food access, these programs also create opportunities for connection, reducing isolation and strengthening community within our housing sites.

## Supporting Newcomers and Building Community

Toronto continues to be a first stop for many newcomers, and this year WoodGreen was proud to stand alongside them as they built new lives in Canada. We successfully completed three major five-year contracts with Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), ensuring thousands of newcomers had access to vital settlement services across the city.

Looking ahead, we are excited to have signed a new three-year Contribution Agreement with IRCC, valued at more than \$15 million. This investment will allow us to expand our programming across East and West Toronto and continue to meet the growing needs of newcomer families.



Over the past year, our newcomer team also focused on building strong partnerships with local community organizations to bring complementary services directly to those who need them most. Together, we made it easier for newcomers to find everything from language training and employment supports to housing and health resources.

We also wrapped up a specially funded provincial program for asylum seekers, which provided tailored services to more than 450 individuals in just one year. For many, these supports offered a critical lifeline at a time of great uncertainty.

## Expanding Pathways to Employment

This year marked the successful launch of WoodGreen's Integrated Employment Services, which are now performing above target across all locations and supporting nearly 5,000 intakes annually. These services provide one-on-one employment counselling, resume and interview preparation, job development and matching, and professional development opportunities that help job seekers upgrade their skills and work toward long-term career goals. By pairing practical tools with personalized support, we are helping more Torontonians find meaningful, sustainable employment.

We were proud to see our Plumbing Pre-Apprenticeship Program renewed, providing another cohort of participants with the hands-on training they need to succeed in a high-demand trade. We also launched new initiatives, including the ILEO Construction Union Pathways Program and the Gooder Building Maintenance Operators Program for youth, which are creating fresh pathways into stable, well-paying careers.

Our Building Maintenance Operators program celebrated a milestone year, with all program targets achieved and 22 graduates moving directly into employment. These successes highlight the power of tailored training programs to break down barriers and connect job seekers to industries that need their skills.

## Building Financial Stability Across the GTA

This year, WoodGreen made significant strides in expanding financial supports that help people build stability and independence.

The Income Transition Project completed its first full year, supporting 1,930 clients with workshops and one-on-one financial counselling to help Ontario Works recipients navigate the complex process of moving from social assistance to employment.

The Financial Foundation for Vulnerable Seniors program saw remarkable growth, reaching 3,659 clients—an increase of more than 260 percent from the 994 clients served the year before. By connecting low-income seniors living in assisted housing with tax support and financial counselling, we are helping them maintain stability and remain housed.



WoodGreen's Income Tax Clinic also played a critical role, helping 5,284 clients access more than \$22 million in tax benefits while saving them over \$1.2 million in filing fees. Among its unique offerings is the Tax Skills for Self-Employed Workers program, funded by Intuit, which remains the only free tax program of its kind in Canada, providing essential support for low-income gig workers.



Collaboration continued to be a cornerstone of our efforts through the United Financial Empowerment GTA initiative. All six participating agencies delivered services and engaged in cross-sector work to address the financial empowerment needs of communities across the region.

Together, these programs are giving people the tools, resources, and confidence they need to strengthen their financial foundations and move forward with security.

## **The Power of Volunteers**

In just its first year, CARES welcomed 50 dedicated volunteers, each making a meaningful difference in the lives of older adults.
